Ref: Intrusion into my computer and corrupting data that interferes with efforts to address major national security problems:

To Mr. Ashcroft:

The attached letter explains how some unknown outside source penetrated my computer via my broadband connection and placed computer codes on certain words that I have listed on the attachment. Thousands of those words were affected, causing me to spend an estimated 80 hours to remove, hopefully, the codes.

The type of words that were affected would be those words that an intrusive government would find of some interest if they were in communications by terrorists or those exposing certain activities in which misconduct involving government personnel and government operations were implicated.

Whoever perpetrated these alterations were interested in having anyone sending or downloading this material identified. It would also delay the completion of the manuscript that reveals criminal and subversive misconduct by people acting in a government position or covert operation.

If government personnel are not the culprits in this problem, the intrusion into my computer through the broadband Internet connection was not by government personnel, I would think that the Justice Department would want to have a highly proficient computer programmer examine the corrupted document, and possibly discover the destination for those placing this material on the Internet. I would be willing to make available a copy of that corrupted document if assured that I be given a complete report on the findings.

If government personnel, and probably under the Justice Department, are implicated, then there is very little likelihood that the Justice Department would be interested in examining the document and providing me with a full report.

Sooner or later it is possible that a suitable source will want to know this information to determine the destination of the altered document.

If you wish to proceed with an investigation as stated in this letter, please advise.
