Ref: Your letter of May 11, 2005, referral from Rep. Waxman (amended letter)

Hello Representative Tauscher,

Your letter to me of May 11, 2007, based upon a referral by Representative Waxman, is probably the result of Waxman not wanting to be shown as non-responsive to the serious matters I brought to his attention. You, then, are left holding the bag, should these matters ever reach the public's attention. However, to make a record, let me bring the following matters to your attention, and maybe you can see why Waxman is seeking to shift blame to you.

First, I am a former federal agent for the Federal Aviation Administration, who, after being given the assignment to correct the conditions responsible for the worse series of airline disasters in the nation's history, discovered deep-seated culture of corruption that played major roles in a series of fatal airline disasters. The airline hijackings of 9/11 were simply ripple effects from what I and other FAA inspectors had discovered during our official and official duties.

I sought to correct these deadly practices while I was a federal agent, and encountered the standard cover-ups, including the cover-ups from members of Congress. I even suffered retaliation to silence me, which contributed to the continuation of preventable airline disasters and deaths.

Seeking to circumvent the cover-ups, as the crashes and deaths continued, I left government and started publishing books and appearing as guest on hundreds of radio and television shows. This resulted in many other government agents and insiders providing me, over the years, with detailed information on serious corruption in other areas of government. Although the corruption inflicted great harm upon innocent people, and on major national issues, the most dramatic result from the corruption was the hijacking of four airliners on 9/11.

Having said that, the latest attempt to get congressional help with addressing recently discovered corruption, that was brought to Waxman's attention, can best be described in the two following examples.

Because of my insider connections, I discovered murders perpetrated by a FBI Supervisory Agent, Lindley DeVecchio, in the New York City offices who had been secretly working with Mafia boss Gregory Scarpa in New York. The Mafia boss, Scarpa, was secretly working with DeVecchio for many years, and among the crimes they committed were murders, which involved the criminal misuse of the facilities of the FBI.

In 2002, I had a book contract with the son of that Mafia boss. Until DOJ prison officials blocked our communications, Scarpa described to me details of how FBI Supervisory Agent DeVecchio and Mafia boss Scarpa engaged in criminal activities, including murders.

Also providing me valuable insider information about this relationship was a former FBI Special Agent who worked under DeVecchio. That former FBI agent was a Lt. Colonel in the U.S. Army and a highly decorated Vietnam War helicopter pilot. That same special agent described to me how, during his official duties, he learned about CIA assets carrying out the White House's secret funding and arming of Iraq during

the 1980s, of which ripple effects including the March 2003 invasion of Iraq by the United States.

In 2002, as I was acquiring this information, Congress was holding hearings on the murders perpetrated by FBI agents in the Boston office. Since what I discovered from these two insiders indicated a corrupt culture in the FBI, which of course also affected national security, I notified every member of the House and Senate judiciary committees, including Waxman, of the two insiders that provided me information about the murders in New York, and urged them to immediately contact me for further information. Not a single one did so.

Four years after Waxman and others covered up for these serious matters affecting national security, a Brooklyn district attorney in 2006 filed murder charges against DeVecchio, based partly upon what I learned four years earlier. These major crimes involving FBI personnel could have been addressed four years earlier were it not for the culture of cover-ups by members of the House and Senate. But this obstruction of justice by members of Congress is “old-hat,” as I and other former government agents have experienced the same culture for several decades.

Another area in which I sought to provide insider information about corruption in the government’s aviation safety offices, that I initially discovered as a key government aviation safety inspector-investigator, and what I learned later from other insiders, related to the areas of primary blame for the 9/11 hijackings. The areas of primary blame for the aircraft hijackings on 9/11 was, obviously, in the government’s aviation safety offices, an area that Congress and the 9/11 Commission carefully avoided. I had repeatedly brought this problem to members of Congress, starting while I was an FAA inspector and while I acted similar to an independent counsel.

A secondary area of blame involved in the 9/11 events was the culture in the FBI and CIA that prevented agents from acting on the indications of the hijacking plot. The present cover-up of these areas will continue, as in prior years, the fundamental problems and enable more tragedies to occur.

Your letter, and Waxman’s response, is simply the culture of those in Congress. I recall sending you a letter dated January 19, 2001, making you aware of the criminal actions being taken by federal judges and DOJ prosecutors seeking to block my reporting of the corruption that had left a long list of tragedies upon the American people and which, eight months later, made possible the hijackings of four airliners and the murder of 3,000 people. You joined a long list of people complicit in 9/11 and the enormous tragedies that continue to follow. Lucky for you and others, media people keep this information from the public, and the public seems to enjoy their state of denial and bliss.

The years of cover-ups by members of Congress have enabled to occur great tragedies, and I have written books about this relationship. The list of books can be found at www.defraudingamerica.com. The latest book that I have written is *Congress and Other Cesspools*, and goes into great detail about this culture and how the American people and the nation have suffered as a result of it. Also at that site are copies of some of the letters sent to members of Congress over the years, with specific information about the criminal activities that I and other former government agents had discovered during our official duties, can be found at that Internet site. I’ll put this letter to you on the site.

Despite Waxman’s other shortcomings, I do applaud him for the aggressive actions he is taking in response to the endless series of corrupt activities by the Bush administration. I will say that for him. As for you, you are a relatively new member of Congress and these matters are probably beyond your grasp, or your ability to bring about any meaningful hearing or investigation.
